UI Voting Fun Facts!

- In 2018, U of Iowa students voted at a rate of 44.9%.
 - This was a 16.7% increase from the last midterm election.
 - Nationwide, youth turnout
 DOUBLED in the 2018 midterm elections.
- At the UI, students in the business and engineering colleges vote at significantly lower rates than their peers in CLAS.
- At the UI, women turn out at a higher rate than men.

Fast Facts about 18-21 year old voters:



- More than 75% say they're paying attention to the election and think it will have an impact in their communities.
- 28% say they have recently participated in a march or demonstration, but that also differs by race and gender. Young women are much more likely to have protested (36%) than young men (20%). And youth of color are much more likely to have demonstrated than White youth (38% vs. 22%), with young women of color the most likely to do so.
- One-third (34%) said they did not know if their state has online voter registration. Just 25% have voted by mail before, and more than a quarter said they wouldn't know where to get information about mail-in voting.
- Young people with no college experience are less likely to be contacted by campaigns and parties and less likely to have information on casting an absentee ballot or to know where to get it, which both reflects and potentially perpetuates inequalities in political participation.






CIRCLE's Youth Electoral Significance Index (YESI) measures the power of the youth vote in various states.

In 2020 Iowa Youth Vote was:

- 5th most influential for presidential election
- 6th most influential for senatorial election
- 1st (IA-01), 3rd (IA-02), and 4th (IA-03) for house election





Young People Hear about the Election Most From Friends and Family

The percentage of young people (ages 18-21) who said they have personally been spoken to about the 2020 election by each type of person

Friend 62%




Hawk the Vote utilizes a friend-to-friend voter engagement strategy.

So far, our voting ambassadors have reached out to nearly 1000 students in one-on-one conversations about voter registration and creating a voting plan for the November election.
